Director's Corner

Definition of Network: An extended group of people with similar interests or concerns who interact and remain in informal contact for mutual assistance or support.

I was recently asked why the KYBLN needed chapters. How could chapters have an effect on employment for people with disabilities? I realized that the questioner didn't really have a true grasp of the method by which the KYBLN anticipates change throughout Kentucky. The KYBLN is a network. Our chapter in Lexington is the core of the network. Alone, our Lexington central offices mean very little. The meaning and activities of the KYBLN must be carried out through our chapters. Basic premises upon which all KYBLN members agree are the unique cultures, topography, social climates, supports, and capital of the various counties and regions in Kentucky. We have several chapters throughout Kentucky that are developing. Northern Kentucky is an outstanding example of interagency collaboration and business buy-in. The Gap and Saint Elizabeth's Medical Center are just two of several highly motivated businesses in Northern Kentucky who are helping to lead this effort. Their issues and activities might well be very different from those in Bowling Green or Paducah, where additional chapters are developing. One area might have concerns about the lack of transportation for employees with disabilities. Another might be apprehensive about local support systems (employment agencies for job seekers with disabilities) when hiring job seekers with disabilities. Other communities could be anxious about liability, employer and employee rights, or types of accommodations that may be needed. These types of issues can only be addressed at the local level. Our staff and members in Lexington have been offering resources, speaking services, and technical assistance to our chapters as requested. However, our chapter leaders and members have tremendous expertise and really know and understand their local businesses and their needs. We have all been working together to:

- assist business leaders to better understand the abilities of job seekers with disabilities,
- assist human resource personnel in locating qualified workers with disabilities through our on-line job bank, and
- promote better communication and rapport between all employees in a given work setting.

This is an exciting adventure for all of our membership. Development of a bona fide network is extremely difficult to accomplish. However, the KYBLN, through the outstanding efforts of our business and human service leaders throughout the state, is approaching the true intention of *network* as defined above. We anticipate increased employment for Kentucky citizens with disabilities over the next few years and more businesses approaching us as a "clearinghouse" for resources and assistance in finding even more job seekers with disabilities!

DOL Announces Grant Solicitations Totaling \$3.0 Million For Home Modification

Two grant solicitations were published in the May 29, 2003 Federal Register by the Office of Disability Employment Policy. The grants, totaling \$3.0 million, will be available for Home Modification and Working for Freedom, Opportunity and Real Choice through Community Employment (WorkFORCE) Action. For people with disabilities, an often-cited barrier to participation in work and community life is the lack of affordable home modifications, such as ramps, widened doorways, lowered countertops and cabinetry accessible to those who use wheelchairs.

Speech to Speech Telephone Service

This service, called Speech to Speech (STS), provides communication assistants (CAs) for people with difficulty being understood by the public on the telephone. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in Washington DC regulates relay service: STS is a form of relay
